Risky Business!

It is good to help other people who have had an accident. But there is a risk - we might get hurt ourselves when trying to help.

<u>Emergency service workers</u> are highly skilled in thinking quickly and carefully, to work out if there are any more risks of injury to the injured person, others or themselves <u>before</u> they begin helping.



TASK 1: There are three examples of accidents in the box below.

Draw a picture for each one in your workbook, to show the accident.

Write down what the danger there might be for a person who gives any help, and suggest how it can be made safer.

- 1. Ryan has a cut from broken glass when playing in the park.
- 2. Ben has fallen off a bike onto a busy road with traffic.
- 3. Jess has burned herself from a firework. She has dropped the firework, but it is still alight on the ground.

TASK 2

Explain: In your own words and using your own examples, explain the meaning of 'risk'.

<u>Write down</u> what risks you might have taken so far today or so far this week, (think about the different risks if you have been outside).



<u>Organise</u> your risk examples from high to low. High being very dangerous – Low being a small amount of risk.
