Write 5 of your own sentences using words with the 'ment' suffix.	
 Activity 1 – Meet some Arctic inhabitants Listen to this CBeebies podcast about creatures that live in the Arctic (click here). Talk about the different creatures that Andy meets on his Arctic Adventure. What animals does he meet? Where do they live in the Arctic? What do the eat? Is there anything else that is interesting about each animal? 	
• Write facts about each animal that he meets. Write in notes, not full sentences. For example:	
Live in big flocks Eider Duck Dive for mussels to eat	
Expert sound like laughing when they quack	

Activity 2 – Information texts

- Read the attached example of an information text about arctic animals.
- Information texts often use these features:
 - A page heading
 - An introduction paragraph to give a quick idea of what the page is going to be about.
 - **Subtitles** to clearly group information on the page
 - Pictures or diagrams
 - Fun fact boxes
 - Written in the present tense (e.g. is instead of was, lives instead of lived)
- Read the example information text and find where these features have been used.

Activity 3 – Grammar – Using coordinating conjunctions

- Subordinating conjunctions are joining words like 'and', 'but' and 'so' and they are used to join two ideas together.
- Read the attached example of an information text about arctic animals. Can you spot where any coordinating conjunctions have been used?
- Look at the information that you collected in Activity 1. For each animal, write three sentences that use 'and', 'but' and 'so'.

For example. The Eider Duck is noisy **and** sounds like it is laughing when it quacks. It spends a lot of time on the ice **but** searches for food under the water. It is often very rough, bumpy and icy in the Arctic **so** the Eider Ducks have learnt to become expert at landing in difficult places.

<u>Activity 4</u> – Putting it all together!

- You are going to write an information text page about two animals that live in the Arctic. Keep looking at the example text so that you know what to include on your page and where to put it.
- Start with a page title that tells your reader what the page is about. Don't forget to underline it.
- Now write an introduction using two or three sentences that tell your reader a little bit of information about the Arctic (like where it is and what it is like there). You might want to use a question to 'hook' your reader and get them interested.
- Write the first subheading. It should be one of the animal names that you are going to write about. Underline your subheading.
- Write three or four sentences about this creature. You could explain where it lives and how it survives in the Arctic. What does it eat? How does it stay warm? Don't forget to use coordinating conjunctions.
- Draw a picture of the animal.
- Write the next subheading for a second animal. Write three or four sentences of information and draw a picture.
- Add a fact box for one of the animals. You might have to do a little bit of extra research to find something really interesting!
- IMPORTANT! Read through your writing to check that you have correctly used full-stops and that each sentence makes sense.
- Check that you have used capital letters for the start of each sentence, names and the word 'l' (and that you haven't used any anywhere else!).
