

Spelling - have a look at these spellings of prefixes and their meanings:

Mis- meaning not	Ex- meaning outside	Re- meaning again
misread	exclaim	replay
misfortune	exile	return
misinform	export	retry
misplace	explode	retake

- How many words can you find in Kensuke's Kingdom in two minutes that have the same prefixes: mis ex and re.
- Now: Use your prefix words that you found or those from above in **your spelling tasks**: Pyramid spellings, copy trace, look cover write, missing vowels.
