# Have you heard of the Indian elephant festival? Its name is Hastimangala.





### Jaipur, city in the Rajasthan state.

The Elephant festival is held in Jaipur, which is a city in northern India. It is usually held on or just before the Holi festival (festival of colours) in March. The people of Jaipur decorate their elephants with vibrant colours, pretty saddle cloths and heavy jewellery. The most beautiful elephant is awarded the winnng prize.












The caretakers decorate their elephant's forehead with head plates and they place gold and silver bracelets on their tusks. The elephant's skin is painted and jewellery is attached to their tusks and legs. Sparkling cloth (saddle cloth) is then draped over the elephant's back. The caretakers also get dressed in beautiful clothing to parade their elephant through the crowd.









Today you are going to make your own 3-D elephant to use in your own elephant festival. The steps on the next slide show you how to make one.








Get the two elephant templates off your teacher and find some scissors to cut them out.

Once they are cut out you will have two elephants that face the opposite way.



Decorate your elephant using coloured pencils, pens, pastels, crayons or craft material. Remember to do the other side too.



Once you have finished the decorations find some cotton wool or tissue paper and stuff your elephant.

Lay the blank side of both elephants on top of one another and start stapling the legs and lower body together.

Remember to leave a gap at the top so you can stuff your elephant later.



Once you have put enough stuffing in, staple the elephant closed.





For an extra challenge you could make a saddle cloth and some ankle bracelets to add to your elephant. What else could you add?
