To explore and create Mehndi patterns.





Do you know what henna is? Do you know how it is used in India?

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Henna is a small shrub that grows in India and other places around the world. Henna leaves are crushed into a powder and then mixed with water and lemonjuice to make a paste. This paste is then used on people's skin, hair and special cloth.





Henna paste is used to create intricate designs on the skin. This process is called mehndi in India. Once the paste has been applied to the skin it needs to be left to dry for a long time. The paste then gets rubbed off and a temporary tattoo is left behind.







What parts of the body are usually decorated with mehndi patterns and why?

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Mehndi patterns are usually created on women's feet, legs, hands and arms. This is because these body parts are seen the most when they wear their traditional clothes or wedding dress.

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Do you know what symmetry means? Mehndi patterns are often symmetrical.



A symmetrical pattern is made up of exactly the same parts on both sides of a line or around an axis.

Can you see the symmetry in this mehndi design? How was it created?






