Day:	Learning Objective:	Lesson:
Monday	To be able to order letters in the alphabet.	 Make a set of letter cards for the alphabet. Mix them up and then time yourself to put them in the right order. Challenge: Shuffle the cards. Then take one card from the pile at a time and put it in the correct place to create the alphabet. (This is tricky. Each time you have to thinkdoes it come before or after this other letter?)
Tuesday	To be able to think of words linked to a story.	 Watch the story 'A house in the Woods' (<u>bit.ly/VPY1ahouseinthewoods</u>). When watching the story pause the video and have a close look at what is happening in the pictures.






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		 Can you think of words linked to the story (think of the characters, the setting, what happens) that start with each of the letters of the alphabet? Go through the alphabet in order. Some letters will be really hard to find words for (don't worry if you don't think of one, but get as many as you can!). Take a photo of your alphabet word list and post to Seesaw
Wednesday	To find the meaning of words in a dictionary. To be able to order words alphabetically.	 Look at / cut out the character trait cards. Look at the different words on the cards. They can be used to describe a character. Do you know what they all mean? No? Then look any unknown words in a dictionary or by using an online dictionary like this online kid's dictionary (https://kids.britannica.com/kids/browse/dictionary). Place the words in alphabetical order (the order that the first letters of each word come in the alphabet e.g. C is before D, so Cat would come before Dog). Take a photo or your alphabetically ordered word list and post to Seesaw.
Thursday	To be able to consider character traits	 Watch the story 'A house in the Woods' again (bit.ly/VPYIahouseinthewoods). When watching the story pause the video and have a close look at what is happening in the pictures. Look at the pictures of different characters from the story. Place the word cards from yesterday on the character that they could best describe. Tell someone in your family why you chose to place each word where you did. Give examples from the story (including what you can see happening in the pictures) to back these reasons up. Which of the characters would you most like to be your friend? Draw the character and write their name. Write one or two sentences to explain why this character would be the best friend. Use evidence from the book in your explanation. Take a photo of your work and post to Seesaw.





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Friday	To be able to write a letter.	 Last week we looked at a letter and you wrote your own. Can you still remember what a letter needs? Can you write a list of these features of a letter? Hints – Think about: where you live, when you wrote it, how you say hello, what you are writing about, how you finish the letter. Imagine that you are one of the characters in the story. Write a letter to me (Mr Rix) to tell me what you and the other animals have been doing in the woods. Tell me what the different animals are like, giving your reasons.
		 Think carefully about each sentence you want to write first. Say it. Write it. Don't forget to use your letters and sounds to write words. Don't forget to start each sentence with a capital letter and end it with a full-stop. Use finger spaces between words and try to write on the line. Remember the things that we have looked at this week and try to use them in your writing: Plural words, words linked to the story, words to describe a character, giving reasons for your ideas.
